The sin of admiring nature

Rabbi Gabriel Botnick reinterprets a surprising Rabbinical teaching

As I sit down to write this piece, my desk is flooded with the sunlight that took far too long to arrive this summer. The rays pull my attention away from the task at hand to appreciate the beauty of nature, which had been obscured by months of clouds and rain.

Of course, I'm not the only one reacquainting myself with the magnificence of the natural world – it seems everywhere I go in London these days there are people enjoying aimless perambulations, afternoon refreshments at outdoor cafés, and the company of guests in their gardens. In short, summer has finally arrived and nearly no one is taking it for granted.

You might therefore be surprised to learn that our sages teach that it is forbidden to stop and smell the roses – as it were. In Pirkei Avot (3:7), Rabbi Shimon says 'If a person is walking along while revising their Torah learning and interrupts

themselves to say, "how beautiful is this tree or field," it's as if that person has committed a capital offence.'

At first glance, this is an incredibly troubling teaching – how could it be so severe an infraction simply to admire a beautiful vista?! The Vilna Gaon explains this teaching by way of another, found in the Talmud (Baba Batra 79a), in which Rabbi Yonatan quotes Proverbs in order to say that anyone who separates themselves from Torah study condemns themselves to the pits of death. In short, for the rabbis, Torah is so important that it cannot be set aside for any matters other than physical or spiritual survival, and to them the appreciation of nature is certainly trivial in comparison.

However, I believe our sages are wrong here and miss the point of Rabbi Shimon's teaching. The issue isn't with someone interrupting their Torah learning to admire their

surroundings – the issue is believing that such an act is disconnected from their Torah study.

In Psalm 92, which we recite every Shabbat, we say: 'How great are Your works, Adonai! Your plans are beyond comprehension.' That is, our tradition provides us with language to express awe and wonder at the impossibly complex grandeur of the universe. The challenge is to remember the One who created such beauty whenever we are so moved by it to take notice.

With the summer months lying in front of us, we will certainly find ourselves in moments of pastoral bliss. I invite you to use those moments not just to say, 'how beautiful is this!' but to allow yourself to contemplate the wonder of it all and to acknowledge the unfathomable source of that beauty.

Deborah Cohen

Former NHS Trust Director and retiring Belsize Square Synagogue Board member



Tell us about your time as a Belsize Square Board member

When I joined the Belsize Board 17 years ago our two daughters were in primary school. They both had their Bat Mitzvahs at BSS and are now in their 30s, living in their own homes.

Little did I know that it would be 20 years before I hung up my hat. During that time I have chaired the Youth Committee, been Treasurer, and chaired the Keshet Social Action Committee during the pandemic. Although I'm standing down from the Board, I'm looking forward to continuing as one of the three Synagogue representatives on the Board of Deputies.

What was the hardest part of your NHS job?

Leaving it – I loved working in the NHS with such fantastic, dedicated people. I tried retirement, but after six months I drifted back into work and I am now the independent chair of the Safeguarding Adults Boards for two local authorities. And I've handed on the NHS baton to our daughters and daughter-in-law, all of whom are NHS clinicians.

If you could do any other job for one day, what would you choose?

Without hesitation, Secretary of State for Health and Social Care. I'd fund both the NHS and social care properly, integrate them, and introduce proper 21st-century IT (for starters).

How did you come to be a member of Belsize Square?

When we moved to Queen's Park in 1994, one of our neighbours invited us in for coffee and told us we *had* to join BSS as that's where 'all the Jews in Queens Park' went. Subsequently we found that 'all the Jews' comprised two other families! It's changed now and the WhatsApp group for local Jewish families has over 250 members. We liked the services at Belsize and the welcome we received. Neil grew up in Middlesex New Reform Synagogue and I grew up in Ilford United Synagogue. He wanted to sit with me and I wanted to pray in Hebrew. So it worked well.

What's your favourite festival?

It's probably Pesach, and although it's loads of work, I look forward to the Seders each year and having all the family around one table together.

Where do you like to sit in shul?

Definitely centre right (that's the seats, not my politics!), towards the back. But I value that you can sit anywhere, unlike the synagogue where I grew up.

The Board of Deputies began its new triennium on 1 June with a new President, Phil Rosenberg. At 38, Phil is the Board's youngest ever President, replacing Marie Van der Zyl after her brilliant six years of service. A former Camden councillor, Phil is senior director of a leading public relations firm. He joined the Board of Deputies as the organisation's Director of Public Affairs and later became the Deputy for Brondesbury Park Synagogue.

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BAT MITZVAH REFLECTIONS

Thirteen, Female and Jewish

For her Bat Mitzvah project, Blaise MacDonald interviewed a spectrum of women, young and old, on what it means to be Jewish and thirteen. This is an edited extract from her research.

Very little literature and few websites or social media consider the perspectives of 13-year-old Jewish girls. We are under-represented. You never hear from us! Before becoming Bat Mitzvah, I wanted to explore what Judaism really means to me by interviewing my friends who are 13 and other women who have strong memories of being 13. So here is an article made by Jewish girls, for Jewish girls.

Being part of a community makes me feel appreciated

I opened my research by asking what part of being Jewish brings them the most joy. Unsurprisingly, they all said, 'the food – bagels, falafels, honey cake, chicken soup...' But friendship featured strongly too. My Auntie Emily reminisced fondly about her upbringing in a fairly orthodox household. 'We had bonus holidays, and I wouldn't have one of my greatest friends if it wasn't for Cheder'. Nicky, my mum's friend, agreed. Being Jewish and 13 in the eighties was 'all about the friends I made'.

Another commonality was highlighted by Imogen, 13, who said, 'Being part of a community, makes me feel appreciated'. I feel the same. Being part of something bigger than yourself, having a web of support, is so important when we are going through so many changes while growing up. Another of my mum's friends, Sarah, didn't have a Bat Mitzvah but at 13 her 'experience of Judaism was driven by the women in my family who helped me think critically about the world'.

I was happy to hear that the friends I spoke to still felt they could express their Jewishness and had not felt threatened by recent events. Imogen said, 'I still wear a Magen David in public, but I would hide it if I felt people around me hated Jews'. I have definitely thought twice about wearing my own Star of David in public, because of antisemitism, but my school has been fantastic, it has a brilliant Jewish Society, where they bribe us with AMAZING kosher pizza – and we discuss Jewish topics.

I am acutely aware of the imbalance between men and women in the Jewish faith. As an orthodox Jewish girl, Imogen said, 'In my synagogue, they don't believe women should be able to leyn... The boys got recognition for their Bar Mitzvahs, I got none'. I honestly found this appalling as Imogen is more orthodox, and knows more about Judaism, than anyone I know, and for her to not be able to show that off makes me angry. I spoke to Ellen, my grandma's friend, about how it felt to grow up Jewish and female in New York in the 1960s. She lived in a primarily Jewish neighbourhood but 'girls didn't have Bat Mitzvahs back then... Jewish boys had Bar Mitzvahs and



She will be having her Bat Mitzvah when she is 14 – which I think is wonderful. I feel very privileged to belong to Belsize Square Synagogue, which has embraced the times and allows women to hold as much power as men. It seems as if not as much progress has been made in orthodox synagogues.

Ellen, Sarah, Nicky and Emily all thought that it was much harder for 13-year-olds now than it was for them in their day. Emily said, 'There is more antisemitism in the world than before.' This is a troubling thought. Although life in our synagogue seems to be equalising for women and girls, life as a Jewish person is becoming more difficult.

I am proud of my religion, proud of being a girl and I love being 13!

Catholic girls had confirmations... and that was it'. She said that she was very upset about that. Nicky remembers moving from a Reform synagogue to a United one, and for the first time she had to sit separately from her brother, 'hidden away'. My friend Scarlett, who has a Jewish father and a Catholic mother, wants to embrace Judaism and has found a way to do this.

Right now, I am proud of my religion, proud of being a girl and I love being 13! My research brought up even more questions, and over the years I look forward to discovering the answers to them. Exploring my faith has made me very excited for what is to come as I grow from being a Jewish girl into a Jewish woman.

REMEMBERING

Vera Pollins

Vera Pollins, former Honorary Secretary of our Synagogue, died at the age of 72 on 16 March 2024 following a long illness. Her close friend Jackie Cohen describes her as having been 'intimately involved in the life of Belsize Square Synagogue from birth.' Her parents, Margot and Lothar Gerard, had fled the Holocaust from their homes in Germany and settled in Finchley where they brought up Vera and her older brother Ron. Lothar was an

Vera met her husband Jon at the B'nai B'rith Young Adults organisation. They married in 1974 and, heartbreakingly, she passed away in the year when they should have celebrated their golden wedding. Their very strong and happy relationship had started with sadness as Vera had lost her mother when she was only 17, and her father then died suddenly when she was still only 22 and recently engaged. Jon's love, strength and ability to make

Vera would not have wanted to be defined by her illness. She was a remarkable person before she became unwell. Life had thrown her challenges and she met them head on. A devoted mother, she dealt with the issues posed by parenthood, making sure her children knew that problems should not be a cause for defeat, but more a challenge to be solved. She qualified as a teacher and worked in several schools before becoming a senior manager for a company training and supplying teachers of children with special needs.

Vera set herself high standards in all aspects of her life. Everything she took on, she took on wholeheartedly, with integrity, wisdom and passion. A warm, modest and kind person, her attributes make her sound quite saintly— but be assured, writes Jackie, her qualities included a cheeky sense of humour and a great sense of fun. An amazing homemaker, her friends all have memories of happy evenings spent round her dining table, enjoying her superb cooking.

She worked tirelessly for Belsize Square, often behind the scenes, not expecting or requiring recognition, just wanting things to be right. She was the 'go to' person for people wanting to discuss shul matters – giving advice that was wise, honest, knowledgeable and unbiased. Annette Nathan, our current Honorary Secretary, writes that she cannot think of an area of Synagogue life that did not involve Vera at some time – apart, perhaps, from finance, which, she says, was never Vera's great love. However, that did not prevent her from transforming into a retailer annually for over 25 years on the grocery stall at the Chanukah Bazaar, now the Chanukah Market. Ultimately Vera, Annette and their husbands would obtain their stock on an annual shopping expedition

to France. Jon hated the shopping element, says Annette, but was kept happy with a good lunch!

Steven Bruck, former Synagogue Chair, knew Vera from childhood and also recalls her constant involvement in every aspect of our Synagogue, always unselfishly thinking of others. 'The encapsulation of a life in a few sentences is always difficult. In the case of Vera, it is impossible. She was an exceptional mother, grandmother, wife and friend who dedicated her life to others. She had an enduring commitment to those she loved, to her loving husband, to her devoted children and grandchildren, to her friends and the extended family of the Synagogue. Her organisational and multitasking skills, as well as her determination and ability to overcome adversity, were inspirational. Her passing is a loss to us all.'

Perhaps a true memorial to Vera's place in our Synagogue's story is in the message that she sent in 2017 when she and Jon were awarded honorary Synagogue membership on her retirement from the Board following the onset of her illness. 'I do truly believe that Belsize Square is a unique community and I am proud to have been able to participate in it. I now leave it up to all of you to carry on the good work and ensure that we will always remain the very special Synagogue that we are'.

She was so proud of all her children and she was a very adoring grandmother to Sophie, Joseph, Ella, Maggie, Mila and Leo.

ISRAEL CHARITY DINNER 2024

Anthony Gee, Chair of our Israel Charity Dinner, reports on this year's memorable event

This year's Israel Charity Dinner was held on Yom Ha'atzmaut, 13 May, and was a huge success, with numbers up on last year and the hall close to capacity. The atmosphere was upbeat and positive, with representatives of the three charities supported by our community joining us.

Rob Nothman was our sensational MC and we were entertained by the London Jewish Male Choir, who sang two sets during the evening. The dinner, produced by Adam Nathan and his excellent team, was truly off the scale and worth the ticket price alone!

Each of the three charity representatives gave presentations. Jeanette Koll from Beit Uri eloquently informed us that the donations received from the dinner will go directly towards therapeutic treatments for their severely disabled residents, including music, light therapy and horse riding. They bring an indescribable happiness to all who receive them.

ASSAF's Tali Ehrenthal spoke about how the current crisis in Israel has negatively impacted the wellbeing of refugees there. The donations received enable ASSAF to operate a youth club and to provide psychological support including individual counselling, as well as comprehensive care and holistic support for young refugees across Israel.

Finally, we heard from Racheli Yaso from Yemin Orde. She spoke emotionally about her own two-year-long journey from Eritrea to Israel. Her love for Israel and for Yemin Orde shone through. Racheli explained how funds received from the dinner would directly pay for trauma counselling and for a secure

environment with dedicated staff. All three charities touched on how much harder their circumstances have become since the atrocities of 7 October. They are missing many male staff and foreign volunteers and are having to cope with additional work with reduced budgets and increased overheads.

Rabbi Botnick closed the evening with a talk entitled 'Tragedy to Triumph: How the Diaspora refined Judaism'. Using Talmudic passages and biblical accounts, he explored how the challenges of exile both threatened and, ultimately, strengthened Judaism. Rabbi Botnick's presentation demonstrated that Judaism is a living and breathing tradition. With the establishment of the State of Israel the nature of exile has changed, prompting new questions about how Judaism might adapt in the future.

The Tikkun embodied the Synagogue's welcoming community and its unique approach, rich heritage and commitment to its values. These are what attracted me to joining its Introduction to Judaism Course last year and preparing for my conversion to Judaism at Belsize Square, having first discovered the services on BelsizeLIVE during the pandemic.
