The London School of Jewish Studies considers equality and diversity implications when entering into contractual relationships with other organisations such as tendered purchasing contracts and collaborative programmes of study.

People not employed by The London School of Jewish Studies but who are involved in our activities, such as visitors, clients, guest lecturers, guest speakers, external contractors etc., are expected to operate within the terms of the general policy.

The policy applies to the treatment of existing as well as potential employees and students.

Responsibility

Every member of our community has a moral and legal responsibility to promote fair and equitable treatment within that community and to respect its diversity.

Overall responsibility for equality and diversity within the London School of Jewish Studies lies with the CEO. Members of the Board of Trustees and senior management are responsible for ensuring that the Equality and Diversity Policy is implemented in their areas of responsibility.

London School of Jewish Studies Statement

All are welcome at the London School of Jewish Studies. We are a modern orthodox Jewish institution whose open policy welcomes students of all religions, faiths and beliefs/no belief.

In the provision of equality of opportunities, the London School of Jewish Studies realises and accepts its responsibilities under the law. It is unlawful to discriminate directly or indirectly in recruitment, employment or education on the grounds of the nine "protected characteristics" in the Equality Act 2010.

These characteristics are: age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, and sexual orientation.

The London School of Jewish Studies aims to provide equality of opportunity for everyone and to proactively avoid any form of unfair discrimination in either education or employment.

Equality and Diversity in Learning and Teaching

We are committed to ensuring that all students enjoy equality of opportunity and are free from any experiences of any form of discrimination whether direct, indirect or through victimisation whilst studying at the London School of Jewish Studies.

We will seek to ensure that all programmes promote equality with respect to gender, sexuality, race, disability, religion/belief (or non-religion/belief), age, and race/ethnic or national origin. We will urge our staff to avoid making assumptions and having expectations of our students based on stereotypes of how particular groups perform or behave.

Student recruitment

We are committed to promoting access to higher education to under-represented communities.

Admissions practices will be free from unlawfully discriminatory criteria.

Questions relating to the applicant's race, ethnic origin, age, disability, religion/belief (or nonreligion/belief), gender, sexuality, marital status or family responsibility will not form part of the selection process.

Support Systems

Induction will include information on this Policy, the complaints procedure, access to facilities for students with disabilities and special needs.

Curriculum

We will provide an inclusive learning environment, which takes account of the needs of all learners in terms of gender, ethnicity, religion, disability, age and sexuality.

Our teaching and learning strategy will reflect the educational needs of a contemporary and diverse student community. Programme leaders will keep under review the importance of including reading lists, academic perspectives, and works of art, role models, attitudes, ideas and other resources which extend beyond those which derive exclusively from a white, Eurocentric background.

Students will have opportunities to discuss equality and diversity issues as part of their learning where the context permits, for example how different groups may be stereotyped and represented.

Our aim is that our graduates and postgraduates leave the London School of Jewish Studies as informed, global citizens, respectful of other people's differences.

There is no specific exemption related to the concept of academic freedom in the Equality Act 2010, but there is reference to curricula. The purpose of this is to ensure that the Act does not inhibit HEIs from including a full range of issues, ideas and materials from multiple perspectives in their curriculum.

The London School of Jewish Studies is committed to academic freedom of expression and thought. However, this is not an absolute right and comments or behaviour which may be unlawful or in conflict with this Policy may, in some circumstances, amount to misconduct and will be investigated and appropriate action taken.

We will use multi-mode learning and teaching methods to meet the needs of a widening range of learners.

Students for whom English is not a first language will be provided with support from the academic tutors and programme leaders.

Programme leaders will ensure through the processes of programme approval and review that the delivery of learning and teaching is consistent with this Policy

Accessibility

We aim to make all our qualifications as accessible as possible and have a comprehensive offer to support all our students.

The BA (Hons) Jewish Education and the MA in Jewish Education use a variety of study materials to address different learning styles. The following elements are in place:

- teaching materials – learning resources may include presentations, websites, audio/video media clips, and interactive activities such as quizzes
- working in a group with other students
- a variety of assessment methods: essays, presentations, posters, etc.
- finding external/third party material
- Online access to all teaching and learning materials relating to the chosen programme

All qualifications require students to complete learning and assessment activities within a required timescale and according to pre-determined deadlines. Students will be required to manage their time effectively and the programme team will help students to develop this skill throughout the degree.

Information on assessment will be available to students at the start of each module. If specific support is required in managing studies; the academic team will be pleased to arrange this.

Disability Support

The London School of Jewish Studies is an institution committed to inclusion and to accommodating any student with special access needs.

Disability is defined as:

‘a physical or mental impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on your ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities’

The definition is designed to be as broad as possible and there are a wide variety of conditions and impairments that will be covered.

We encourage students who may have specific access needs to disclose this information at interview, so that appropriate measures can be put in place ready for the start of their programme.

All disclosures of this nature will be treated in strict confidentiality and will follow the guidelines of the General Data Protection Regulation (2018).

Students are directed in the first instance to their Personal Tutor and/or Director of Studies about any special access needs that they may have.

UK Students aged 19-25 years

Any students aged 25 years or under who have particular learning needs or an EHC plan will be supported by the academic team to ensure they are able to access our programmes effectively.

The London School of Jewish Studies is committed to its responsibilities under the Special Educational Needs and Disability Code of Practice (2015) and will endeavour to work closely with the relevant local authority and students' support network to ensure the best possible experience for the student.

Harassment and Bullying

The London School of Jewish Studies is committed to a working and learning environment that is free of intimidation or unlawful harassment as defined in the Equality Act 2010.

Harassment and/or bullying are serious offences that may lead to Staff or Student Disciplinary Procedures being invoked, for very serious harassment or bullying offences, dismissal for gross misconduct or expulsion could occur.

Maternity, Paternity and Adoption

The London School of Jewish Studies is committed to supporting our students who are prospective parents by birth or adoption and those who have experienced pregnancy-related bereavement.

Once informed of a pregnancy or adoption, The London School of Jewish Studies will work with the student concerned to ensure that reasonable adjustments are put in place in a timely manner in line with our duties under the Equality Act 2010.

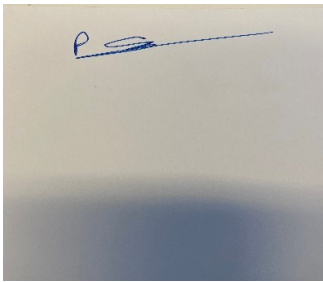
